

Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA)

- Program created by President Obama in 2012
- Let some undocumented immigrants who were brought to the U.S. before they were 16 get protection from deportation and a work permit
- Lasts for 2 years, with renewals
- Recipients also get social security cards and drivers' licenses

California leads nation in DACA recipients

DACA (continued)

- California has the most DACA recipients
- 3/4 DACA recipients are from Mexico
- Right now, DACA still exists!

What will happen to DACA?

WE DON'T KNOW.

In the meantime:

- NEW DACA applications: NOT recommended
- DACA renewals: OK, but you may lose \$495 filing fee
- Either way: GET LEGAL ADVICE

GOVERNMENT HAS PROMISED NOT TO USE DACA INFORMATION FOR ENFORCEMENT PURPOSES

New Enforcement Priorities

Under Obama Administration:

- National Security
- Criminals
- Immigrants arrived since January 2014
- Immigrants with removal order after January 2014

January 25, 2017 Executive Order:

EXPANDS ENFORCEMENT PRIORITIES

New Enforcement Priorities

- Immigrants who have been convicted or charged with criminal offenses
- Immigrants who have committed crimes (without being charged or convicted)
- Immigrants who have engaged in fraud or misrepresentation
- Immigrants who have abused public benefits
- Immigrants who have orders of removal
- Immigrants who pose a risk to public safety or national security

New Enforcement Priorities

- "Crimes" very broad: could include minor offenses like jaywalking, driving without a license, etc.
- Priorities as a whole could be interpreted to include all undocumented immigrants
 - "Entry without inspection" could be considered a crime
 - Any immigrant who entered without inspection or overstayed a visa could be considered a threat to public safety or national security

Executive Order/7 Country Bar

- Halts all refugee admissions for 4 months
- Halts Syrian refugee admissions indefinitely
- Bans entry of nationals of Iraq, Iran, Libya, Somalia,
 Sudan, Syria and Yemen for 90 days
- A Federal Court in Washington State has blocked enforcement of the order, so right now refugees and nationals of the 7 countries can enter the United States.
- However, this could change at any time.

How to Protect Yourself

If you are a LEGAL PERMANENT RESIDENT:

- Can you become a CITIZEN?
- Can you petition for family members?

BENEFITS of CITIZENSHIP:

- Can petition for more relatives, more quickly
- Cannot be deported!
- Can vote in local, state and federal elections

How to Protect Yourself

- If you are UNDOCUMENTED:
 - Talk to an immigration service provider
 - Make a family plan
 - Child care arrangements(notarized letter of guardianship to someone with legal immigration status)
 - Emergency contacts
 - File of important documents
 - Have the telephone number of an immigration lawyer
 - Get a California AB60 driver license
 - Avoid DUIs!

If You Are Approached By ICE

- Remain silent
- Refuse entry into your home unless they have a warrant
- Use your right to speak to a lawyer and make a phone call
- Refuse to sign any papers before you talk to a lawyer
- Report ICE raids 1-844-363-1423 or text 877877

If You Are a Victim of a Crime

- File a police report
- Cooperate with police investigation
- Get help

PUBLIC SAFETY

- California state and local law enforcement: can not require an individual to disclose their immigration status during traffic stops or similar circumstances
- TRUST Act (2014): California police should not keep individuals detained if they receive an ICE "hold", unless it is signed by a judge.



EMPLOYMENT

- It is illegal for an employer to report the immigration status of an employee to local, state, or federal agencies. Considered a violation of worker's rights.
- California prohibits municipalities, counties, and other state government entities from passing mandatory E-Verify ordinances that apply to private employers

Private employers in California are not required to use E-Verify, to do so voluntarily.



EDUCATION





 California Dream Act (2011): undocumented students have access to public school scholarships, CalGrants (state financial aid), and fee waivers at California community colleges



HEALTHCARE

- Undocumented immigrants can't receive federal assistance or public benefits. However, they can receive emergency services, medical care and other programs as "necessary to protect life and safety."
- Undocumented children (under 19) receive MediCal.

Common Immigration Remedies

Ways to Obtain Legal Immigration Status:

- Family petitions
- Protection for victims of crime (VAWA, U Visa, T Visa)
- Asylum/Refugee status
- Temporary Protected Status (TPS)
- Employment visa
- Cancelation of Deportation
